PROJECT HOMELESS CONNECT 2009

-A SNAPSHOT-

Project Homeless Connect for Lane County 2009 took place on Friday, March 6 from 9:00am – 3:00pm at the Lane Events Center at the Fairgrounds, 13th and Jefferson Streets in Eugene. The event served **1,548 guests** with the help of **652 community volunteers** and **401 service providers representing 105 nonprofits, government agencies and businesses.**

The following is a sampling of services provided during the day:

- 3,405 personal and dental hygiene kits given away
- 2,380 meals served
- 262 hair cuts or beard trims by Supercuts
- 202 consultations about employment
- 198 patients had a dental exam
- 146 saw a doctor or nurse
- 125 people applied for rental housing
- 110 pets received flea treatment, nail clippings or ear cleaning. 46 spay or neuter vouchers were distributed.
- 100 people received vouchers for eye glasses from Rainbow Optics



Some basic demographics of event guests in 2009:

- 39% of guests were women.
- 14% identified as Veterans.
- 12% of guests were children under the age of 18 (an increase of 7% over the previous year). 1% were seniors 65 and older (a decrease of 1% from the previous year).

The majority of guests came to the event with a medical, dental or vision concern. 70% do not have health insurance.

The most requested services at Project Homeless Connect were basic needs, food, dental services, vision exams or glasses, housing, haircuts, medical services, and help with employment.

HISTORY

Project Homeless Connect is part of a nationwide movement to:

- ~ increase access to services for people who are homeless or at risk of being homeless
- ~ engage the community in finding a solution for homelessness

Project Homeless Connect for Lane County is a local effort to:

- ~ improve access to services for people who are homeless or at risk of being homeless in Lane County
- ~ offer our community one day and one location in which individuals and families who are without safe and stable homes can address basic needs and access critical services
- ~ engage and increase the involvement of individual volunteers, the business and non-profit community to work together to provide access to services and long term solutions for people who are homeless
- ~ provide a venue where the community can welcome its homeless citizens as neighbors
- ~ leverage private, corporate and foundation money and in-kind support to augment city and county efforts to expand services for people who are homeless in Lane County

Project Homeless Connect for Lane County was conceived by local community leaders who attended the 2006 Oregon Leadership Summit on Ending Chronic Homelessness. These individuals, representing private service providers, the Lane County Human Services Commission, Cities of Eugene and Springfield, and the United Way of Lane County, believed that this event would make an important contribution to the following initiatives:

The Lane County Ten Year Plan to End Chronic Homelessness, approved in November 2006 by the Lane County Board of Commissioners.

Helping the Homeless in Eugene, a Eugene City Council Goal. In 2007 Mayor Piercy appointed a “Blue Ribbon Committee” to seek financial support toward ending homelessness.

The City of Springfield’s standing commitment to provide for its most vulnerable citizens.

HOMELESSNESS IN LANE COUNTY

2,684 people are homeless on any given night in Lane County, meaning they are living on the streets or in temporary shelters (Lane County Human Services Commission 2009 One Night Homeless Count taken January 28, 2009). Staff and volunteers from 22 Lane County organizations that provide services for homeless people went to the streets, under bridges, in parks, at food pantries, day access centers, churches, shelters and other locations to count the number of sheltered and unsheltered homeless people on that particular day. Of these 2,684 people:

- 2,232 individuals were counted as homeless (includes emergency, transitional housing and homeless street count individuals) AND 452 individuals were receiving housing assistance to prevent homelessness
- 1,233 were unsheltered either because they were turned away due to a lack of shelter availability or they were otherwise unable to access shelter (55%)
- 237 family households with children (a total of 726 individuals) were homeless
- 167 homeless people identified themselves as veterans; 92% of homeless veterans were chronically homeless
- 189 homeless people were counted in rural areas of Lane County (five food pantries, two rural access centers, one rural school reporting, one youth agency)
- 1,149 (51%) identified themselves as chronically homeless

Total One Night Homeless Shelter Count and Street Count: 2,684

Homelessness in Lane County requires more than just a one-night count, as the numbers below describe.

Homelessness: Education and County-Funded Social Services

- 1,605 children in Lane County Schools were homeless in 2007-08 (Oregon Dept. of Education)
- 11,784 individuals in 9,322 households who were homeless sought social services through Lane County Human Services Commission-funded programs during calendar year 2008
- 1,980 homeless people received medical services at the Community Health Center of Lane County in 2008

Cost of Homelessness (updated Spring 2008, Lane County HSC): Homelessness affects all residents of Lane County because people without shelter require costly support services:

- \$389 is the average cost of a visit to the Sacred Heart Hospital Emergency Room
- \$300 is the average cost of a visit to the McKenzie Willamette Emergency Room
- \$996 is the average daily cost of care at the Johnson Unit, Sacred Heart's acute psychiatric care facility, where the average stay is 9.2 days

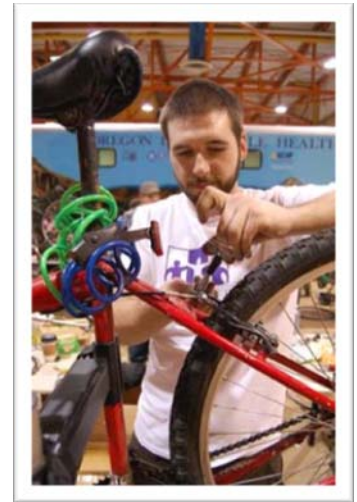


Café Services

- 11 local musical acts provided 6 hours of entertainment

Transportation

- 100 bikes were valet parked
- 87 bikes were assessed
- 25 bikes were repaired
- Over 100 bike helmets were distributed
- Over 50 people received bike bells
- 600 people rode LTD to and/or from the event
- 761 vouchers were distributed for follow-up appointments after the event

NEXT STEPS

The cycle of homelessness can only be broken through a comprehensive, community-wide approach that offers housing and human services to those in need. Coordinated planning and collaborative service delivery are essential to helping people avoid homelessness. The following goals have been identified as part of Lane County's plan to end chronic homelessness in the next ten years:

- 1. Prevent homelessness whenever possible. This can be done, in part, through the use of short-term rental and utility assistance to individuals and families at risk. When a household does move to homelessness, re-house them as quickly as possible.**
- 2. Create new permanent housing beds for chronically homeless persons**
- 3. Increase the number of homeless persons staying in permanent housing**
- 4. Increase the number of homeless persons moving from temporary housing to permanent housing**

5. Increase employment among homeless persons.
6. Gather accurate and timely information about homelessness so that the community can identify people who are homeless and plan effective programs to end homelessness.

Project Homeless Connect encourages community members to take the following steps all year to help end homelessness in our community:

1. Volunteer with social service agencies and faith communities that work with homeless people. A list of local nonprofits seeking volunteers is available at www.unitedwaylane.org.
2. Donate used items, such as clothing, sleeping bags, coats, backpacks, and toiletries, to organizations that work with the homeless.
3. Make a tax-deductible contribution to a Lane County nonprofit organization.
4. Be an advocate for homeless or at-risk people with local, state and federal elected officials.
5. Educate people at your place of employment, civic groups, and social networks about the issues faced by homeless families and individuals. Let them know what they can do to help end homelessness.
