#### Youth Homeless Demonstration Program (YHDP) 2018 Funding Announcement Summary

#### Due May 15, 2019

#### Overview of Funding Opportunity:

- Up to 25 communities will be awarded, 8 of which will be rural communities.
- Purpose: To support the development and execution of a coordinated community approach to preventing and ending youth homelessness, and sharing that experience with and mobilizing communities around the country toward the same end.
- Population: Youth experiencing homelessness, including unaccompanied and pregnant or parenting youth, where no member of the household is older than 24.
- Awards range from \$1 million to \$15 million, based on each community's youth population size and poverty rate. Total YHDP funding available: \$75 million.
- This application is for community selection only. Applications for funding individual projects will occur after communities have been selected.
- CoC Collaborative Applicant is responsible for submitting the YHDP application. If selected, the community will then be able to apply for project funding via project applicant.
- Projects are expected to follow CoC Program requirements, unless a waiver is obtained.
- Selected community may or may not include entire geographic area of the CoC.
- Communities represented by the CoC Collaborative Applicant must include a youth action board, the local or state public child welfare agency, and a broad array of other partners.

#### Timeline for Selected CoCs:

- Awards will be announced in the Spring of 2019.
- Once HUD announces selected communities, they will have 4 months to submit a Coordinated Community Plan and up to 4 additional months to address comments from HUD.
- All grants for projects will be for an initial 2-year grant term. Funds must be obligated by September 1, 2020 and spent by September 20, 2025. CoC Planning grants are exceptions, with 1 year duration, non-renewable, always new applications. Projects may be renewable in next CoC Competition.
- Estimated Project Start Date: 8/15/2019
- Estimated Project End Date: 8/14/2021

#### Format:

- Maximum 30 pages, double spaced, 12 pt. Times New Roman.

#### Selected Communities will:

- Develop and implement a Coordinated Community Plan to prevent and end youth homelessness.
- Receive a dedicated team of technical assistance providers to advise the development and implementation of the Coordinated Community Plan.
- Participate in an evaluation that will inform the federal strategy for preventing and ending youth homelessness.

\*The weighted mean score is the mean CoC score weighted by Annual Renewal Demand. CoCs that scored higher than the weighted mean score were more likely to gain funding relative to their Annual Renewal Demand, while CoCs that scored lower than the weighted mean were more likely to lose money relative to their Annual Renewal Demand.
