# FY22 HUD Continuum of Care Competition Summary

On August 1st, HUD released the FY22 Continuum of Care Competition Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO). Lane County Human Services Division, as the Collaborative Applicant for OR-500 CoC, will complete the CoC Application on behalf of the Continuum, in collaboration with co-applicants Homes for Good and St. Vincent de Paul.

# Key highlights

- Approximately \$2.79 billion is available through the FY22 CoC Program Competition NOFO, including up to \$80 million for YHDP renewal grants (n/a for Lane County) and at least \$52 million available for Domestic Violence (DV) Bonus projects.
- The CoC Application is made up of three parts:
  - ✓ CoC Consolidated Application
  - ✓ Project Applications
  - ✓ Priority Listing (Ranking)

#### Renewals

Lane County as Collaborative Applicant will work with co-applicants Homes for Good and SVdP to submit all eligible renewal project applications in e-snaps for submission with the Consolidated Application and Priority Listing. All projects (new and renewal) are required to be ranked by the CoC. Renewal project eligibility and evaluation occurs through the Intent to Renew and Evaluation process.

# **New Funding Opportunities**

New projects may be created through reallocation or bonus funding (up to 5% of Final Pro Rata Need (FPRN)) for all component types PSH, RRH, Joint TH-RRH, HMIS, and SSO-Coordinated Entry\*.

Lane County released a Request for Proposals opportunity on August 11<sup>th</sup> which is due August 18<sup>th</sup> at Noon (PST). Agencies interested in the Bonus or DV Bonus opportunities must apply through this RFP.

Should no viable proposals be received, Lane County as the Lead Applicant may submit a proposal on behalf of the CoC for either opportunity, Bonus or DV Bonus.

Reallocation, Consolidation and Expansion: Opportunities are available for CoCs to consolidate grants or expand existing renewals (using bonus or reallocated funds). CoCs are encouraged, when appropriate, to reallocate funds from lower performing projects to higher performing projects, in alignment with established <a href="CoC Reallocation Policies">CoC Reallocation Policies</a>. No projects are being recommended at this time for reallocation, consolidation, or expansion in FY22.

Performance-Based Decisions: Requests for new project applications are not allowed, other than through reallocation, unless the CoC evaluates and competitively ranks projects based on how they improve system performance and HUD will prioritize funding for CoCs that have demonstrated the capacity to reallocate funding from lower to higher performing projects.

Coordination with Housing and Healthcare: The Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2022 directs HUD to provide incentives to create projects that coordinate with housing providers and healthcare organizations to provide permanent supportive housing and rapid rehousing services. In the FY 2022 CoC Program Competition, CoCs may receive up to 14 points on the CoC Application if the CoC Priority Listing includes new project applications created through reallocation or the CoC Bonus that utilizes housing vouchers and healthcare provided through an array of healthcare services providers.

#### **Timeline**

The CoC Application is due to HUD by September 30, 2022. CoCs are required to establish a local competition timeline and deadlines.

The quick turnaround time on this year's NOFO may result in swift deadlines for local competition processes, including selection of new projects and submission of project applications in e-snaps.
