# **Emergency Management**

Mission: To ensure that the County is prepared for emergencies by arranging coordination of protection, prevention, mitigation, response, and recovery activities that increase the County's capabilities to minimize loss of life and reduce impacts from disasters.

- Emergency Response
  - EOC Operational Readiness (EOC)
- Emergency Planning
  - Emergency Operations Plan (EOP)
  - Community Wildfire Protection Plan
- Building Partnerships
  - Coordination with stakeholders with emergency services responsibilities
- Preparedness
  - Training key personnel in the EOC
  - Developing, training and exercising the EOP
  - Liaison between Eugene-Springfield, County Staff, Public and Other Agencies for Emergency Preparedness

- Recovery
  - Holiday Farm Fire Ongoing
  - Financial Staff Hire Limited Duration (LD)

**FTE**: 5.50

**Proposed FY 22-23 Resources:** \$570,646 **Expenses**: \$1,109,979





# **Emergency Management**

- Currently a 5.5\* FTE Staffed Program
  - Emergency Mgmt: 2.5 Regular + 1.0 LD
  - McKenzie Fire: 2.0 Regular
- Continued support to COVID-19 response and Holiday Farm Fire Recovery efforts.
- Continuous updating emergency operations plans, developing training plans, and building relationships with stakeholders.





\* Counties similar in size have 6.0 FTE



### FY 22-23 Changes

### Service Changes:

Holiday Farm Fire continues to result in significant variations to our budget due to supporting ongoing expenses incurred for fire response and recovery efforts.

Disaster Housing Program/Staff migrating to H&HS.

## Measuring Performance

- Meet required criteria of Emergency Management Performance Grant.
  - Conduct at least 3 trainings and 3 exercises for key personnel assigned to a Department Operations Center or critical positions in the EOC annually.
  - Update Response/Mitigation Plans and Assessments.
    - Lane County Multi-Jurisdictional NHMP by 2023, to include city partners and special districts.
    - Update components of the Emergency Operations Plan.
    - Complete Capability Assessment.



# Future Challenges & Opportunities

- Continued alignment of emergency operations plans with state and federal guidance.
- Implementation of National Qualification System (NQS) at the local and state level.
- Utilize recent events to develop a Disaster Recovery Plan and a Cost Recovery Plan.
- Expansion in State Emergency Management Department (OEM) and Oregon State Fire Marshal (OSFM) requirements will place more demands on local programs.
