The town of Blue River, experienced a total loss of all commercial property, the postal service, library, and the local clinic. The fire had significant impacts to the single drinking watersource for the Eugene/Springfield population. Displaced over 500 residents. This program serves as the county government's coordinating function for local, state, and federal recovery resources.

The long-term disaster recovery manager has been extended beyond the initial two-year position and is responsible for planning and coordinating fire recovery activities and projects; managing state and federal grant funds; collaborating with partners in the government, private, and non-profit sectors; and preparing and delivering reports and making recommendations regarding the use of state and federal recovery funding. The position serves as the primary county interface with Oregon Housing & Community Services (OHCS) which is the state department responsible for managing Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery funds. The program has a second FTE (a Sr. Program Services Coordinator that is not funded with General Fund) responsible for administrative functions including contract management, grant distribution, and financial tracking.
