Suicides in Lane County, Oregon

Oregon

Suicide is an important public health problem in Oregon. Suicide ranks the 8th leading cause of death among all ages in the state. Oregon suicide rates have been higher than the national average for the past three decades, and the rate has been increasing since 2000. Suicide deaths (N=782) and rate (19.7 per 100,000) were higher in 2014 than in previous years.


Lane County

Based on the data of 2003 to 2012 --

Approximately 61 people died by suicide in Lane County each year. The county suicide rate of 17.7 per 100,000 was about the same level of the state average; this is approximately 40% higher than the national rate.

Most persons who died by suicide were white males.

Firearm, poisoning and hanging were the most common mechanisms of death.

Mental and behavioral health problems, relationship problems with intimate partners, physical health problems and recent criminal/legal problems were the most reported factors surrounding suicide incidents. More than one third of persons who died by suicide had disclosed their intent to kill themselves before they died.
