#### I. MOTION

#### II. AGENDA ITEM SUMMARY

The Board is being asked to approve the Lane County Commission on Children and Families' (LCCCF) membership recommendations for new member appointment/reappointment.

#### III. BACKGROUND/IMPLICATIONS OF ACTION

#### A. Board Action and Other History

On February 21, 2007 the Lane County Board of Commissioners approved the expansion and Lane Manual revision to increase the membership of the Lane County Commission on Children and Families advisory board to 21 members. Staff met with the Commission's Membership Committee and began a recruitment process according to the County's Administrative Procedures Manual (APM) guidelines for advisory boards. Applications were received and interviews were held.

#### B. Policy Issues

According to ORS 417.760 (1) (a) the membership of local commissions shall include a Chairperson and a minimum of eight members, and reflect the county's diverse populations [ORS 417.765 (1).] Lane County CCF bylaws further break down membership into two (2) County Commissioners, one from a rural and one from a metro district; three (3) youth representatives (between the ages of 15 and 20 at the time of appointment; and two (2) rural representatives. The remaining fourteen (14) positions (for a total of twenty-one), have no specific requirements except that ORS 417.765 (1) also states that local commissions must have a majority of laypersons.

#### C. Board Goals

Appointing new members directly support the goals of the Board as follows: One of the overall goals of Lane County's Strategic Plan is: "Provide opportunities for citizen participation in decision-making, voting volunteerism and civic and community involvement." The goals of the 2005 Lane County Diversity Action Plan include: "Lane

County will ensure that County boards, commissions and committees are reflective of the diversity of Lane County populations."

#### D. Financial and Resource Considerations

There is no significant financial impact of these recommended actions.

#### E. Analysis

The LCCCF Membership Committee believes that active and connected community members improve outcomes for children, youth and families. The applicants have demonstrated willingness to make a four year commitment and to share the breadth of their expertise & knowledge to do Community Mobilization work in Lane County.

- 2. I have lived in Eugene since 1975, except for a brief assignment at the University of Portland and another at Eastern Washington University in Spokane. My entire career has focused on the well-being of children and families, both as a teacher/director of early childhood programs and in training teachers for grades Pp-12. I am currently employed as the Coordinator of Northwood Preschool, and launching a family and divorce mediation service. Both roles bring me closer to the needs of both healthy and struggling families in the Eugene-Springfield community. Serving on the Commission on Children and Families would allow me to express the great affection and appreciation I have for living in Lane County, as well as advocate on behalf of the population I've served throughout my 30-year career.
- 3. Since serving as a Head Start teacher in the 1970s in Washington, D.C., I've been concerned about the quality of early childhood programs provided to our youngest citizens. Too often custodial in focus, or at the other extreme inappropriately academic, these programs tend to reflect conventional wisdom rather than solid research about developmentally appropriate practice. I would bring insight about high quality, age-appropriate early childhood programs to the Commission.

I have also worked extensively with children and adults who come from diverse backgrounds, and understand the issues related to socioeconomic, racial, ethnic, and linguistic diversity. Again, my concern is insuring balanced approaches to the design and delivery of services and programs to address the needs and preferences of children and parents from outside the traditional mainstream culture. And my greatest interest has consistently been to obtain information about these needs and preferences directly from children and parents, rather than filtered through the mainstream lens.

As for advocacy for representation of diverse groups, I have been visible in every work assignment in employing persons from diverse backgrounds, forming parent and/or teacher education groups with representatives from underrepresented groups, and insuring that educational programs and services specifically accommodate the needs of diverse learners. This has been a principled position at the local and state level, both in paid positions and service roles. More than once, these principles required separation from paid employment in favor of doing the right thing for students. I've never regretted nor apologized for taking such a principled position.

5. In addition to extensive experience with students and parents of diverse backgrounds, I am well acquainted with policies and practices related to equitable admission, placement and participation of all persons in educational programs, services and activities. I have written such policies for the UO College of Education, Northwest Christian College, and Eastern Washington University, and been responsible for their implementation. This expertise may be useful when examining or forging policy statements in the future.

# 1. Give a brief description of the experience or training that qualifies you for membership on this advisory committee (If you wish, you may attach a resume or other pertinent material.)

My formal training is in the field of education. I hold an Oregon Teaching License; I have a Masters Degree in Education and have worked in Oregon schools. Though my experience in education may be of some value to my work on this committee, it has been my work directly with children and families that makes me qualified to be a member and would make me an asset to this committee. Two years ago my husband and I took a homeless teenager into our home. We got her health care coverage, mental health services, legal advise and ultimately reunited with her family. Four years ago one of my students in foster care found her placement situation deteriorating. My husband and I began the process of becoming foster care providers. Those experiences helped to make me aware of the unique challenges of children in those populations and ignited my desire to help. It is my years working with children in a variety of settings, these experiences, and my desire to help which qualify me for this committee.

## 2. Why do you want to become a member of this committee, and what specific contributions do you hope to make?

For many years I have been a teacher/administrator and advocate for children. I have worked with families to meet the needs of children, I have protected children who found themselves in unsafe situations, and consider myself a children's rights advocate. In that I have much experience working directly with children and families, I would now like to work on larger projects to better serve their needs to the benefit of the greater community.

## 3. List the community concerns related to this committee that you would like to see addressed if you are appointed.

As a teacher and administrator working in a small rural school in Lane County I had the occasion to form very close relationships with students. As a result I came to be (sometimes acutely) aware of issues involving children in foster care and issues facing homeless children and children living in poverty. I would like to work on building programs, and inter-program communication that aid children aging out of the foster care system, systems of support for their continued success, college/housing/transition assistance as well as support services for homeless children and children living in poverty.

4. Briefly describe your present or past involvement in relevant community groups. (Having no previous involvement will not disqualify you for appointment.)

I have been on the Board of Directors of Blue Mountain School since 2003. When I began my association with that non-profit it was an Alternative Education Provider for South Lane School District; it is currently chartered with that district. I am also currently on the Board of Directors of the Blue Mountain School Foundation and have been since 2005.

5. As I said above I am currently on the Boards of Directors at Blue Mountain School and Blue Mountain School Foundation. These are advisory positions.
